Far too often I hear congregations

Pastor's express a desire to "grow" with no language about mission attached. This usually tells me how desperate congregations are to "survive". But survival is not the Church's

mission. Survival for congregations usually means keeping the doors open and often the only reason "new" people are wanted is for their money to continue to maintain established ways of "doing church". People often tell me that they want younger people in their congregations, but I have not yet heard any language about wanting any new ideas for ministry from them. All that's wanted is numbers and cash to prop up what may very well be a tired system that is no longer relevant. Younger people are more interested in being church than in doing church, anyway. Being church involves acting as Jesus calls us to act: with love and compassion, mercy and kindness. It means reaching out to our neighbors without stopping to check color, sexuality, political affiliation, appearance, smell, or whatever criteria we make up to exclude people from our community and communion.

One of the points that Bill Easum makes in "Sacred Cows Make Gourmet Burgers" is that committees can kill mission faster than anything else. When discussing mission and ministry become the apex or model of congregational governance, rather than action, a congregation might as well hang it all up. Life in all aspects is about balance; if there's too much discussion with little or no action, the result is the death of ministry. If there's too much action and not enough discussion, the result can be chaos. Lutherans love committees, but this often means that action is lacking. #### 10 VERY POSSIBLE REASONS YOUR CHURCH ISN'T GROWING

Sometimes you and I make life out to be more mysterious than it actually is. You [might] ask why you keep getting speeding tickets when the simple truth is you usually speed.

You might wonder why your friendships are so conflicted when the truth is you gossip.

Healthy things grow. The mission of the church at its best throughout the centuries has been an outward mission focused on sharing the love Jesus has for the world with the world.

So with that in mind, here's a list of ten things that might be holding your church back from realizing the potential of its mission. We're often the last to see what so many others see, and once we see it, we can deal with it. Progress often ensues.

#### 1. You're In Conflict

Have you ever been in someone's home as a guest only to have your hosts start to argue with each other? When that happens, it often leads people to want to run out the door. Why would church be any different? If a congregation is constantly bickering and arguing, why would any new people stay? It's not that Christians shouldn't have conflict, but we should be the best in the world at handling it. The New Testament is a virtual manual of conflict resolution, but so many of us prefer gossip, non-confrontation, passive aggression, pettiness, and dealing with anyone but the party involved. We talk more *about* people than *to* people. Growing churches handle conflict biblically, humbly, and in a healthy manner.

#### 2. You're More In Love With The Past Than You Are With The Future

This can be true of churches that are in love with tradition and churches that are have had some amazing days recently. When congregations become more in love with the past than they are with the future, the end is near. If your church is a museum to 1950 or even 2012, the likelihood of reaching the next generation diminishes with every passing day.

#### 3. You're Not That Awesome To Be Around

Fake. Judgmental. Hypocritical. Angry. Narrow. Unthinking. Unkind.

Those are adjectives often used to describe Christians, and sometimes they have their basis in truth. There are certain people who are energizing to be around. Unfortunately, too many Christians today don't fit that description. Jesus was mesmerizing. Paul caused conflict for sure, but he had many deep relationships and incredible influence.

The early church was known for compassion and generosity. If people truly don't want to be around you, don't let the reason be because you haven't let Christ reshape your character.

#### 4. You're Focused On Yourself

Too many congregations are focused on their wants, preferences, and perceived needs. They are self-focused organizations and self-focused people. It should be no surprise that outsiders never feel welcomed, valued, or included. If you want to reach people, you can't be self-focused. After all, a life devoted to self ultimately leaves you alone.

#### 5. You Think Culture Is The Enemy

If all you ever are is angry at the culture around us, how are you going to reach people in that culture? Christians who consistently expect non -Christians to act like Christians are baffling. Jesus never blamed pagans for acting like pagans, but he did speak out against religious people for acting hypocritically. If you treat your unchurched neighbors like the enemy, why would they ever want to be your friends? If you want to keep being ineffective at reaching unchurched people, keep judging them.

#### 6. You're Afraid To Risk What Is For The Sake Of What Might Be

Let's face it, at least you've got something going for you. You're paying the bills. You at least have X amount of people. If you've had any modicum of success recently, you're going to be hesitant to risk what is for what could be. The greatest enemy of your future success is your current success. When you're perpetually afraid to risk what is for the sake of what might be, you might as well cue the funeral music now.

#### 7. You Can't Make A Decision

Governance will become a major issue for future churches. When your decision making is rooted in complex bureaucracy or congregational approval for every major change, it makes decision making difficult and courageous change almost impossible.

#### 8. You Talk More Than You Act

Most church leaders love to think and love to debate issues. Effective leaders add one more component. They act. Most church leaders. . . overthink and underact. If you acted on even a few more of your good ideas, you could possibly be twice as effective in a very short time.

#### 9. You Don't Think There's Anything Wrong With Your Church

These churches are on their way to soon having not much more than a small club for the already convinced.

#### 10. You're More Focused On [fill in the blank] Than You Are On God

Some congregations get so focused on petty issues that they forget it's not about us, but about God and God's mission. We invite people to come and experience the living God, we don't lead people to experience us or our awesome church. When we keep the focus on Christ, genuine life-change happens and endures.

All of these items are things to pray and to think about as you work your way through this transition. Remember that we go as God calls us, not necessarily knowing where we're going or when we'll get there. Knowing that the living God leads us is enough.





#### Central Lutheran orders its Palm Sunday Palms from "Eco-Palms"?







#### By choosing Ecopalms for Palm Sunday we chose to promote environmental and social justice!

#### **Promoting Social Justice:**

- · Harvesting palms is an important source of income but gatherers receive a low price
- Gatherers will receive a higher price for their "fair trade" palms improving their income.

#### Promoting Environmental Stewardship:

- · Palms protect valuable natural forests because they provide income to forest communities.
- · Palms are "sustainably" harvested and managed protecting the palms and the forests they need for shade.

#### Why a "Fair Trade" Palm?

- · To improve income and living conditions for the communities gathering the palm.
- To protect the palms and the important forests from which they are gathered through sustainable harvest programs.

#### Did You Know?

- · Approximately 308 million palm fronds were consumed in the United States in 1998.
  - Palm purchases for Palm Sunday may be worth up to 4.5 million dollars/year.
    - · Palm gathering actually protects valuable natural forests.
- At least half of the farmers in the Central Petenof Guatemala earn additional income from harvesting fronds and, more than a
  quarter of household heads support themselves exclusively by collecting fronds.
  - Each palm plant produces 2 to 5 harvestable leaves over a 2 to 4 month period.

OTC is at a crossroads.

After 10 years with On The Corner (OTC), I have made the difficult decision to resign from this very special ministry. For the past 8 years I have had the honor of serving as the

Program Director of OTC and volunteered for 2 years prior to that. First and foremost, I want to thank my staff, volunteers, OTC committee members, and CLC members for your support over the last decade; without your generosity, OTC would not be the thriving after school program that it is today.

It is with a heavy heart that I am making the decision to step down. I will be forever proud of the work OTC has done on behalf of at risk youth in our community, having witnessed the significant impact our program has had on the over 650 kids we have served. Although challenging at times, I have had countless rewarding moments that I will cherish for the rest of my life.

Our church is in a time of transition. It is critical that CLC members take time to evaluate and discuss the future of our ministry, especially with regards to community outreach. As an active member of CLC for the past 31 years, I strongly feel that community outreach is a vital piece of our church mission and vision. I am unsure if this is a shared priority. I feel that we have lost sight of the importance of reaching out to do God's work beyond our church walls. Below are the current mission and vision statements as found on the CLC website:

#### OUR MISSION

Central Lutheran Church is a welcoming and caring community of faith, reaching out in service to others to meet the needs of our neighbors locally and globally.

#### OUR VISION

Our congregation is committed to seeking and welcoming diversity as we reach beyond our boundaries to our larger community through faith, fellowship, and in service to others.

Now I ask you, what ministries and outreach are we doing to fulfill these statements?

I would like to think OTC is not done. Central Lutheran Church has the opportunity to keep this ministry by supporting our current assistant

program director, Diana Gonzalez, as she prepares to take over my position. However, without financial support beyond the \$8400 that CLC annually provides, this ministry *will* end in June. While I am grateful for this contribution, I have long felt that if CLC truly wanted to sustain this program, the burden of funding a director's salary would not fall on the director to secure externally.

Together we have grown a program that has served countless families in our community as well as collaborated and received grants from over 35 local and state organizations. OTC has been recognized by numerous Yakima agencies as a critical asset for at risk youth in our community. I urge you to continue God's work through this amazing ministry.
