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Plans, plans; we all make plans. Plans are good to make and good to have, but we also have to be flexible. Sometimes things don't go as we plan, and usually it's because we have no control over surprise circumstances that

end up scuttling those plans. If our plans are scuttled somehow, then we can abandon the whole plan and make a new one, or we can massage the plan we already have to fit the circumstances. This is where flexibility comes in. The more flexible we are, the more we can roll with changes, the better we can make something better out of scuttled plans.

CLC staff have plans. We plan to return to a full worship schedule in the fall: Sunday school, adult ed, a fuller liturgy, moving communion reception back into the sanctuary. We also are keeping in mind, as we hope you are, that we are still in a pandemic and none of us knows what the fall will bring. The Delta variant is showing itself to be highly contagious, and early cases, although few, are found mostly in unvaccinated people over 50. This, too, could change. The virus could mutate again. We don't know right now, obviously. Any surge in the virus once again could affect how worship is practiced. This is not living in fear, as we in this country have been taught to do for the last several decades, but living realistically. We don't fear because scripture tells us that love casts out fear. We are called to love fearlessly, boldly, and fully, not reserving it for those we tag as "deserving", because where would we be if God loved only those who deserve it?

So we have some plans. We hope and pray that all will be as we plan in the fall, but we also remain flexible. Even if our plans don't come to fruition the way we'd like, what's important is that we know that God is leading us, that Jesus is with us, and that the Holy Spirit calls, gathers, and enlightens us within the body of Christ.

Remembering the words of the Teacher, Qoheleth, or Ecclesiastes as we know him could be helpful in planning:

For everything there is a season and a time for every activity under heaven: ² a time to give birth and a time to die, a time to plant and a time to uproot what is planted; ³ a time to kill and a time to heal, a time to tear down and a time to build up; 4 a time to weep and a time to laugh, a time to mourn and a time to dance; ⁵ a time to scatter stones and a time to gather stones. a time to embrace and a time to refrain from embracing; ⁶ a time to seek and a time to lose. a time to keep and a time to discard; ⁷ a time to tear apart and a time to mend, a time to be silent and a time to speak; ⁸ a time to love and a time to hate. a time for war and a time for peace.

Whatever happens in our life has been touched by God somehow. When we believe that it's God who makes the sacrament effective, for example, then we receive the body and blood of Jesus. If we believe that time, place, and setting are what make it effective, then we really should think twice about receiving the Lord's Supper, because we may be eating and drinking judgment on ourselves, as Paul writes in I Corinthians II.

Remembering what Robert Burns wrote, as well, could be a good idea when making plans: The best laid schemes o' Mice an' Men / Gang aft agley. The best laid plans of mice and men often go awry.

Being flexible helps us to adapt, and we are on the edge of coming out of an enormous adaptive challenge right into another one. How will CLC meet that challenge post-pandemic? Because this won't be the last pandemic we face. I do hope we learn from this one.

Here's to planning for the fall!

What is Central Lutheran currently doing for Outreach?

A lot, actually. Thanks to funding from Endowment Committee, we have made the following donations:

ELCA World Hunger: \$5,000.

Yakima Valley Habitat for Humanity: \$5,000.

La Casa Hogar: \$5,000.

Camp Hope: \$2,000.

Volunteer involvement opportunities are, and/or will be available with providing meals at Camp Hope, as well as building with Habitat for Humanity.

Previously Church in Society allocated congregational funds to various projects locally and globally. As congregational funds diminished, there were no longer funds to allocate and this committee disbanded.

Council President, Karen Baken, asked the committee to become active again, and our current funding source is through Endowment funds. A portion of proceeds from invested funds are available to the Property Committee, and to Outreach. Church in Society can make requests to Church Council, and, if approved, which can then be submitted to Endowment Committee for approval.

We can all be thankful that, even as our congregation faces the challenges of transition, that we are actively doing God's work in our community and our world.






