In my pastor's report for the annual meeting, I wrote a kind of "state of the church" letter and I'm hoping that you all had a chance to read it. I'm also hoping that you as a congregation are curious enough to

want to discuss it, or to want to talk about discussing it. These are issues that concern the entire congregation and should be discussed by the whole congregation if you're interested at all in the possibility of moving your church community toward health, even incrementally. Everything I've read about churches in decline proposes that when churches have everyone in the congregation engaged in mission and ministry to whatever level they are capable, they thrive. Thriving churches can attract new people, which gives you the perfect opportunity to introduce new people to experience the living God with you. That would a big step towards vitality, health, and viability, and what a way to fulfill God's call! The key is to get **everyone** invested, engaged, and involved.

Are you interested in talking about thinking about maybe considering that step?

If you're not, then all right. Things will continue here as usual, so you don't need to worry. The boat will stay calm, and no one will have to feel uncomfortable. Christians in the United States are nothing if not comfortable. Comfort, however, is the hobgoblin of faith and Jesus definitely does not call us to be comfortable. He calls us to follow him.

If you're thinking you'd rather wait for your new pastor to come and make things better, you may be waiting for a while. No pastor is going to come here and "fix" everything for you. No pastor can do that at any church, because the work belongs to the congregation. No pastor has a magic bullet or magic formula to make things go back to the way they were in whatever year it might have been when things were perfect. Becoming fully engaged in mission and ministry might be hard work, but it is to what followers of Jesus are called. We are called by Jesus to follow the way of the cross, and that can be uncomfortable. In truth, it **should** be uncomfortable. Following Jesus puts us at odds with the world and that is rarely a comfortable place to be.

Psychiatrist C.G. Jung talked about "inner work ", which is the work of self-differentiation for an individual. This is an important characteristic to have when living in a system, and we all live in at least one system, and that's our family. A congregation is an emotional system, like a family.

Differentiation helps us not to get sucked into the drama that affects many families and congregations. Self-differentiation is what Paul was talking about in Philippians 2, especially in verse 12.

The good news is that, even though this congregation may be most of the problem, you also are most of the solution. Emotional systems, like a congregation, seek stasis, that is, stability. Stasis is a big reason why conflicts and tensions get covered over, ignored, and even denied because stasis is comfortable and most of us like to be comfortable. Comfortable, however, will not move anyone or any system forward. A system is powerful and everyone plays a role in it. If just one person changes their pattern in the system, that change eventually will affect and even change the whole system, like the proverbial plucking of one thread of the spider web. As you likely know, although change is really a value neutral word, it can be either good or bad, depending on how those in the system view it and handle it. Change can become a step down the path toward a healthier church, or it can entrench a system even more.

In which direction do you want this congregation to go?

It's up to you. If you'd like to talk about any of this, please contact me or leave a message with Lea in the office. If enough people are interested in exploring possibilities, we can call a congregational meeting in January.




Wow. Where did this year go?! Last day of November already. The annual meeting is over, and a huge thanks to all who participated. We have new council members for 2022, the budget is passed,

BIBLE STUDY AND ADULT EDUCATION


