#### This and That

Here's a couple of things I've been thinking about lately.

#### The Lord's Prayer

Most of you probably have noticed that the Lord's prayer printed in the bulletin is a little different than what you are used to, but I'm sure you know that there is both a so-called "traditional" version and an "ecumenical" version in the hymnal. The "traditional" version uses, in my opinion, antique language and some King James English. Of course there's nothing wrong with that. Those of us who grew up with the old red hymnal, Service Book and Hymnal, got a taste of Anglican chant in the liturgical music and a whole lot of King James English to go along with it. I remember very well following along in the hymnal at weddings and thinking that "thereto I plight thee my troth" was a complicated and ultimately silly expression. But that's the way it was for a long time. After a while, I started to think that Latin would make more sense than King James English.

Then the LBW came along and we were introduced to the ecumenical version of the Lord's prayer. This version was issued in 1988, along with ecumenical versions of the creeds. The funny thing is that these versions of the creeds were quickly adopted by most congregations, but this version of the Lord's prayer has gained much slower acceptance. I suspect that part of that goes back to earlier hymnals, from which so many of us learned both the prayer and Psalm 23. I can still recite the twenty-third psalm from memory—in King James English.

That doesn't mean I always use that version, though. It's good for us to hear things that we know very well in a different version sometimes. It can help us pay more attention to what that poem or that prayer is saying. When we pray the words, "your kingdom come", what if we really meant that? Think, some time, about what the words that you're saying mean, even when you're saying them by rote. Words can and do have meaning, and usually a deeper meaning than we give from simply reciting something.

The upshot, of course, is that I think we don't all need to be praying the same "version" of the Lord's prayer. Nowhere does either Jesus or scripture say that it needs to be recited in unison with everyone using the same rhythm and cadence. In some places where this is done, it sounds cultish. That's never a good thing. You are welcome to use whichever version you prefer, including another language if you like. The words will still mean the same things.


#### The Word "Amen"

This is a word that comes to us from both Hebrew and Greek scripture, and it's used a bit differently in the New Testament.

Sometimes we'll read or hear about Jesus starting a sentence with the words "truly, truly I tell you. . ." The word "truly" in this case is "amen" in Greek ( $\alpha\mu\dot{\eta}\nu$ ). When this phrase comes up, "truly, truly I tell you", that's our clue to understand that Jesus really means whatever comes after it. It's an affirmation.

The word "amen" is an affirmation for us, too. This is another word I hope you'll think about the next time you say it. We use it to conclude prayers: "through Jesus Christ our Lord, Amen." What you are saying, there, is "yes, we do ask these things through our Lord Jesus Christ." It is the proper response to receiving the body and the blood of Jesus: "the body of Christ, given for you. Amen." It's your yes to what is being said or what you are experiencing. Yes. This is the body of Jesus, given for me, and his blood shed for me. Yes, I believe this is true. Yes, I believe.

Remember that "amen" is your, the congregation's, word. It is not usually the pastor's word. It is your seal of approval, your statement that yes, this is true. It's your "yes, I believe" in response to prayers or actions. So don't be afraid to belt it out. "Amen" tells the world and those around you that you believe. It tells the pastor the same thing and is music to God's ears, too. Amen. So be it.

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

In January we addressed the need to reduce plastic waste, and here is more on that subject:

TIP: When buying at the grocery store try to choose produce, and other products that are packaged in the least amount of plastic possible. There still are choices...if not many to buy unpackaged produce, or items in paper, rather than in plastic clamshells.

For each mile of global coastline on our earth, we produce 5 garbage bags of plastic waste each and every year. In the north Pacific there is an area of 600,000 square miles (2x the size of Texas!) that consists of floating plastic waste. Please try to do your best to reduce the amount of plastic that comes into and then is discarded out of your home.
