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<sup>1</sup>In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. <sup>2</sup>He was in the beginning with God. <sup>3</sup>All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being <sup>4</sup>in him was

life, and the life was the light of all people. <sup>5</sup>The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

<sup>6</sup>There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. <sup>7</sup>He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. <sup>8</sup>He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. <sup>9</sup>The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

<sup>10</sup>He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. <sup>11</sup>He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. <sup>12</sup>But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, <sup>13</sup>who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

14And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. 15 (John testified to him and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me.") 16 From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. 17 The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. 18 No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known. (John 1:1-18)

The gospel of John does not have nativity songs like Luke does, but John does have a hymn to Christ in chapter one, verses one through 18, known as the prologue. The gospel of John does not have a birth story like Luke's, but John does proclaim that the Word became flesh and dwelt among us. The gospel of John does not say that the one conceived by the Holy Spirit would be the son of God,

but John does say that the one who became flesh was with God from the beginning, and what God was, he was. The gospel of John does not say that God's son was wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger, but John does say that the revelation of God was concealed, effectively hidden, in a human body.

Just as the gospel of John is different from the synoptic gospels, these verses are different from anything in any of the other gospels. It's a poem that segues into prose starting in verse 19, but it has a clear beginning and ending and focuses on the Word of God—an appropriate focus for Christmas and Epiphany. At one level, John's entire gospel is an extension of verse 18, which says: "No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known." I always think it's a shame that we don't get more of John's gospel in our lectionary; it's treated largely as a fill-in. It's the gospel we turn to when one of the synoptics doesn't address something necessary.

Like the broader character of John's gospel, this passage, like most passages from John, are cosmic in nature, much bigger than the sum of its parts.

This prologue from John is an important text for Christmas. It's assigned to Christmas evening, and sometimes is read on Christmas Eve while the lights are low and the congregation is bathed in candlelight. John I is the perfect text to read as we reflect on the mystery of God coming to humans as a human. The prologue of John's gospel tells us that, even though God came to us this way, there is still mystery surrounding God that we will never know or understand. A fundamental human yearning is to know God, because to know God is to know eternal life. But no one has ever seen God, as John says, and even though God is the creator and sustainer of all life, knowledge of God does not come by observation or by gathering proof. Because God is gracious toward the world as we read in John 3:16, the darkness of ignorance and death ends with the coming of

the Son as the One who reveals all, including God. In fact, the only way we know God is through Jesus. God created and sustains us and the whole world by the Word, or Wisdom, which some scripture treats as a separate individual from the Word. There's an ancient Hebrew story that says Wisdom once asked God's permission to come and live on earth. God granted permission, but when the earth proved to be evil, foolish, and inhospitable, God made Wisdom into a book, the book of Moses, to dwell in the tents of Jacob. But for John the evangelist, the eternal Wisdom, the Word, becomes not a book, but a person: Jesus of Nazareth.

In his commentary on John's gospel, Martin Luther wrote this: "The world, and particularly we in the church, who possess, preach, and confess God's word, must remain familiar with this evangelist. . . Therefore, we propose to consider his gospel in the name of the Lord. . . and preach it as long as we are able, to the glory of our Lord Christ and to our own welfare, comfort, and salvation, without worrying whether the world shows much interest in it. Nonetheless, there will always be a few who will hear God's precious word with delight, and for their sakes, too, we must preach it. For since God provides people whom he orders to preach, he will surely also supply and send listeners who will take this instruction to heart."

Not everyone who met Jesus in his ministry on earth experienced God, for a variety of reasons, and this is still true today. I'm not saying that God can't work with and through closed people, but I do think God prefers to work with and through people who are open and not closed. As John tells us, to all who do experience the living God because they're open to the Spirit, God gives power to become God's own children.

May your Christmas and Epiphany seasons be blessed with mystery and revelation.

### New Year, New Life with Amazing Grace

Did you know The beloved hymn "Amazing Grace" was written by John Newton in late December 1772 as he was preparing for a New Year's Day sermon January 1, 1773? When John Newton, a former sea captain, wrote the lyrics of "Amazing Grace" for a sermon on New Year's Day 1773, he could see the "prodigal son" in his early life. His own father tried on several occasions to help him, but Newton was a hardened prodigal, a self-confessed "wretch" (a word he borrowed from Romans 7:24), distant from the heart of his father as well as the heart of God. Still, John Newton discovered that God in Christ's deep and abiding love does not give up on anyone.

#### Birds in Winter

Whether you are an avid bird enthusiast or someone who finds their droppings on your car, deck or patio an annoyance, the truth is we need birds.

Birds provide services as pollinators, dispersers of seeds, scavengers, and they keep insect and rodent pests in balance. Unfortunately since the 1970s the earth has lost one out of every 4 birds, which amounts to a loss of 3 billion breeding birds. What can we do? Most of bird losses are due to reduced habitat, but especially during the rigors of winter these are three things we can do to help out our feathered friends.

- 1). Provide high fat foods like oil sunflower seeds, suet, and even peanuts.
- 2). Make water available. This may require heating water to prevent freezing. Birds can eat snow but it drains their precious energy reserves.
- 3). Provide shelter like plant cover, roosting boxes, or even offering seed in sheltered places.

Birds are warm blooded like we are and need lots of food intake to keep their bodies at 106°. It is a myth, by the way, that feeding birds in the winter prevents them from migrating, so go ahead and do something to help out our important feathered friends this winter.
