Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

It is good to be here!
My husband John and I moved to
Yakima from Ephrata early in March
and have been unpacking and settling
in. We love the area and are excited
to be here. By the time this
newsletter is published, we will have

already celebrated our first Sunday Service together on March 26th and be heading into Holy Week.

The Gospel of John is my favorite gospel. It is used heavily during Lent and Holy Week. John dedicates seven chapters to the last 24 hours, deal with the Last Supper and Jesus' final words of instruction to his disciples. Jesus wanted to prepare his disciples for their upcoming mission.

In his Farewell Discourse, Jesus calls his disciples to many things. He calls them to unity, to love one another, serve one another, and to bear fruit. Jesus not only tells the disciples what they are to do, he also tells them how they will be able to do these otherwise impossible things he commands. Jesus summarizes the how in the vine and branches teaching in John 15. John 15:1-17 is the chiastic center and ultimate focus of his whole Farewell Discourse. This "how" is at the heart of his instruction to the disciples and summarized in John 15:4-5:

Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing – John 15:4-5.

Abiding, spending time daily in prayer and meditation, gives us peace in the midst of the turmoil of life, helps nudge our hearts to align with God's will and the eternal work God wants to do through us, unites us together, and keeps us centered on Christ. It is a vital first step in our discernment process as we ask what God is calling us to in the future. It is more than a coincidence that church researchers have yet to see sustained forward movement and revitalization in congregations that

were not undergirded by prayer. I invite you to join me as you are able in the chapel on Tuesdays, from 12:15-12:45pm, to practice John 15:4-5 and pray for Central Lutheran and God's plans for her. I plan to do this every Tuesday beginning 4/18, through 5/25.

Central is an amazing congregation and I am really looking forward to getting to know each one of you better. One of my goals for this year is to have one-on-one conversations with each of you. I'd like to hear your hopes and what is important to you. There are quite a few members here so this will take a while, but it is important as we begin our life together. In addition to beginning the work with council toward developing a 5-year plan for Central, my other areas of focus this year include relaunching New Member Classes and Confirmation Classes. More about those later. So stay tuned!

My installation will be held on Sunday, April 23rd, at 3:00pm. It will be a festive occasion. I hope you will be able to come.

I am excited to be here and am looking forward to getting to know each of you and discerning together the good things God has in store for us at Central Lutheran.

Summary of March council meeting For the congregation:

The council met March 21. Kirsten compared March Madness philosophy of teams being dedicated to each other and working full heartedly toward their goal of winning the championship to us at CLC and how we must all work

together using each other's special skills. By working together in a disciplined manner we too can achieve our goal of bringing Christ to others around us and realizing the Kingdom of God in our midst. Verses out of Philippians Ch.3 used.

Pastor Ann Murphy was gracious enough to join us and let us introduce ourselves to her.

The installation service for her will be April 23th at 3:00 pm although she will start working with us Sunday, March 27th. Her new email is pastorannmurphy@clcyakima.org. This will be a nice way to communicate with her if you want to.

Cheryl Bush and Lea Ramirez joined us to help explain and inform the council about the formation of and workings of our finances. They explained the make up of dedicated funds and how they are to be used and monitored. Also, the Memorial Fund was brought to our attention and how it is to be used. Being as it has grown over the years from funeral gifts, it was decided that while we are waiting for the insurance checks to be issued we can use these memorials to help pay for the repairs of the dedicated library. The roof leak and subsequent damages in the pipes and ceiling there and over towards the office are being done by Baxter Construction. Tim Franks will send out an explanation of this situation in a later communique with the congregation.


The council had several requests from Church in Society comm. These would be funds from the Endowment committee. The council needs to approve the request before it is then sent on to the Endowment for their approval for the projects with the understanding that the requests fit into our stated mission of CLC. The requests were for \$5000. For the Rotary Food Bank and \$5000. for the ELCA Lutheran Disaster Relief Fund to help victims of the earthquake in Turkey and Syria. Two other requests were sent back to the CinS committee for a revision and more clarification. They may resubmit them later.

Bart Roderick requested funds for attendance at the A.G.O. (organ) convention in Portland. These funds will come out of Thrivent Choice Dollars that our church is issued each year. It was explained that the church is a non-profit and cannot rent per se. We can, however, charge a fee for building usage to outside groups. They must fit into a purpose of our mission. The future of OTC was discussed. A time for a forum meeting will be arranged by the Youth and Family committee in order to show the results of the survey and let people have a time to expression their thoughts and concerns. This will happen very soon. They also were asked to draw up a job description for a youth and family director that we could advertise. The feeling was that we need to take care of our own church family first before we start offering a program for outside individuals.

A housing resolution was signed by president Karen Baken to issue the permission for Pastor Ann to use in her housing allotment.

A vote approved the request of a new subgroup of Boy Scouts (girls) to join the troop we already have.

If anyone needs more details of the council meeting, they are posted out in the narthex once they have been approved at the following month's meeting.

St. Patrick's Day may be behind us but thinking about our clothing choices is an important way to make sustainable, earth-friendly choices.


The clothing industry is probably second only to the oil industry for being a source of global pollution. Manufacturing clothing pollutes by generating microfibers, and using huge amounts of water, plus utilizing chemicals that are used to grow, treat, and dye our clothing.

What to do?

- 1). Buy nothing and get along with what you have (cheaper, too!)
- 2). Buy less, or buy second hand clothing (again cheaper)
- 3). Buy things made of sustainable fabrics that include polyester from recycled plastics, organic cotton, and responsibly grown and processed wool.
- 4). Choose styles that are classics, rather than "fast" fashion
- 5). Buy locally, and as directly as possible.
- 6). If things are being shipped to you, choose entities that ship in minimalist, and eco-friendly packaging.
- 7) When discarding, make every attempt to have the items reused, as very few textiles are actually recycled.


