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

On October 31, 1517

Martin Luther nailed his 95 Theses to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany. This date has come to signify the beginning of the Protestant Reformation.

Luther had been carefully studying Romans and was struck by Paul's understanding of righteousness and the grace of God.

Salvation comes through faith alone, by grace alone, not through good works or paying money for indulgences.

At its heart, the Lutheran Reformation was an exegetical one. The Renaissance had birthed an interest in the ancient classics and an appreciation of Greek and Greek grammars. Meanwhile, the fall of the Byzantine Empire created an exodus of biblical Greek manuscripts into the West. As a result, the Bible was beginning to be read again in its original language. An appreciation of a more historical grammatical method of interpretation was growing. Additionally, the German nobility were growing increasingly tired of being under the church's thumb and the common people were suffering under the church's heavy burdens.

Luther capitalized on the recently invented movable type printing press. In fact, the 95 Theses is considered the first modern media event. Thanks to the printing press, Luther wrote and distributed his literature on a scale never seen before.

Luther targeted his message specifically to the common person, not just the academic elite. For this reason, Luther's religious literature was in the vernacular, a concept unprecedented in its day. Today, Luther is considered the father of the modern German language as he found a way to unify the language and communicate across all the various German dialects.

Luther also had a keen ability, when need be, to write plainly and dissect arguments succinctly. This allowed Luther to publish his writings in pamphlet form. These convenient and readable tracks soon found their way to kitchen tables across Germany and throughout Europe.

Martin Luther was indeed the one appointed for the hour. Luther's remarkable mind, his understanding that his message required the vernacular, the invention of the movable type printing press, and the political, social and religious tide of the times created a broad-based platform for Lutheran reforms. The Reformation Luther launched advanced tremendously as a result.

### **Caring for Creation:**

Most prescription or over-thecounter medications should NOT be flushed down the toilet or rinsed down the sink. Careful disposal after expiration, or a change in your prescription will prevent others from using your old drugs accidentally, or

intentionally. Careful disposal also prevents harmful residues from getting into our environment.

Here are your best options:

- 1) Find a drug take back center near you by calling 844-482-5322, which is easy as 844-4-TAKE-BACK.
- 2) Another option is to put smashed tablets in a baggie, mixed with other garbage, dirt, coffee grounds, sawdust or kitty litter, then throw in your garbage.

Knowing how to dispose of medications is important as it is risky to hang on to medicines no longer needed. Do your part for the environment as well as for the safety of those who have access to your home.
