Happy New Year!



As we begin the new year, we also enter the season of Epiphany. I like the idea of starting the new year in the season of Epiphany. The word "epiphany" refers to something "made manifest" or "revealed." When you come up with a brilliant idea, you might say that you've had an "epiphany moment." In the church year, the season of Epiphany is about how Jesus reveals

God to us. Jesus, the light of the world, illuminates, exposes, saves, protects, reveals, warms, and nourishes our lives.

The season of Epiphany kicks off with the story of the wise men who see a strange new star appear in the West and travel toward it. The wise men were from Persia, probably around what is now Iran. They must have had access to the prophecies of ancient Israel because they seemed to know that Israel was expecting the birth of their Messiah and King.

It is good for us to look at the story of the wise men and think about what it might mean for us. First, this story makes it clear that Jesus began his mission of reconciling the world to God at the very start. It also informs us that sometimes epiphanies require more from us than to simply notice them. They might be a call to action. Maybe this is why the wise men are called wise – their clarity of dedication to a mission, their motivation to act on it, and their ability to adjust their expectations and keep their eyes on the goal as they cope with the inevitable obstacles tossed in their path.

The amazing thing is that when we start paying attention and noticing God's presence around us, and when we start becoming obedient when we feel that nudge of the Holy Spirit to act, we become nothing less than living epiphanies for other people! So one day, when in a church service and asked to name God moments or think about epiphanies, they can say, "There was a time I was in need and someone came along who helped me out, seemingly out of nowhere!"

The world is full of epiphanies — it could be a new star in the heavens or the birth of a child. Commit this new year to being attentive, and to act when called upon. Ultimately, that is how the kingdom of God breaks into this world — little moment by little moment. I can't think of a better New Year's Resolution than seizing these moments and not allowing them to pass us by.

Caring for Creation

Salt of the Earth?

We probably can't escape January without dealing with ice or snow at some point.

Did you know that 40% of US use of salt is for road de-icing? It is so much use that it presents an environmental challenge as salty water seeps into ground water, drinking water, rivers and streams increasing chloride levels.

On our own property we can make a choice as the salt can damage our own lawns and landscapes.

We need to be safe, but we have choices. Options to using rock salt directly include:

- Sugar Beet Juice is biodegradable, but rather than putting some sugar beets on to boil, it might be easier to search for products that provide this safe and effective product.
- CMA or calcium magnesium acetate, which is effective and harmless, but a bit pricey.
- Sand, provides the cheapest, and minimally troublesome product. This is environmentally neutral and provides traction rather than a chemical melting agent.

Keep Safe in your realm this winter, but try options that are Earth friendly.


