Our Lenten Journey



Our Lenten Journey began on **Ash Wednesday** when we remembered that

we are but dust, and to dust we shall return. We humbly prayed for God to make our hearts clean while we rejoiced that "now is the day of salvation." We trust that as in the very beginning, God creates beautiful things out of dust. Our 40-day journey has begun.

On the **First Sunday in Lent** we followed Jesus into the desert for 40 days of testing. Here, we were invited into the Lenten practices of quiet reflection and the acceptance of limits. In the quiet, we begin to recognize the subtle ways that God shows up, moments of connection that go unnoticed in noisier times. In the loneliness of dry seasons, we find courage, hope, and assurance that in the trials of life, God is still with us.

The following Sunday, **Lent 2**, we joined Abram and Sarai on their faith journey. We were amazed at God's incredible promise to a man who was almost 100 years old and to a woman of ninety. We join our faith with that of Abraham who hoped against hope in the promises of God. When the world and even our own logic might have us think otherwise, we know that we can always trust God's promises.

On **Lent 3** we meet Jesus in the temple for a cleansing. Jesus did not find things in the temple as they were supposed to be. We are reminded to ask ourselves the question, "How are things supposed to be?" Whether the site in question is the Jerusalem temple, or our church, or our own hearts and lives, the question remains the same: How is this supposed to be? Is God honored by what God finds here? The temple cleansing episode also anticipates two other episodes that will follow — the crucifixion and the resurrection.

The gospel text for the **Fourth Sunday in Lent** contains one of the most familiar passages of the scripture John 3:16, "for God so loved the world..." God so loved the world that God lifted Christ to the cross and to resurrection life. Christ's saving death upon the cross accomplishes the work of salvation. By this grace we are saved through faith. God lifts what God has made, even us, that we might display the crafted good works of God prepared in advance for us to do. Notice that the gift of the Son is intended not for condemnation but for salvation, for God's judgment comes in the form of light.

On the cusp of Holy Week, on the **Fifth Sunday in Lent**, we hear from the prophet Jeremiah that God is making a New Covenant with the people. God says, "I will write it on their hearts...and I will be their God, and they shall be my people." Ours is a God who is ever at work in every possible way to turn us around, refine us, cleanse us, and draw us back. This New Covenant is the New Testament that will be given to us in Christ's sacrificial death.

Holy Week begins on Palm | Passion Sunday. We will follow Christ from his triumphal entry into Jerusalem to the cross, each waypoint of the journey marked by Jesus' compassion for those who would betray, mock, accuse, or do violence to him. We enter Holy Week with both grief and thanksgiving in our hearts, trusting in God's redeeming love.

The events of Holy Week move quickly. Next comes **Maundy Thursday** when we gather to celebrate and remember the Last Supper Jesus has with his disciples. We will also experience a hand washing ritual that will move us through Pilate's basin, to the Baptismal basin, and finally to the Servant's basin.

Our Lenten observance comes to an end as we gather with Christians around the world to celebrate **Good Friday**. In the passion narratives very little is said about Jesus' physical pain and agony. It's as if what we are meant to feel is not the whip of cords, the nails, or the spear, but the emotional pain: the betrayal, the abandonment, the isolation, the public humiliation.

There is no human suffering that is not felt by God on the cross. There is no pain or loss that is not pulled into God's heart. There is no kind of death that doesn't die with Jesus. And yet, on Good Friday we don't approach the cross from a place of fear or shame, but with boldness, as if it were the very throne of grace, so that we may receive mercy and . . . help in our time of need (Hebrews 4:16). We lay down our burdens, our hearts, even our very bodies before the cross, trusting that all those things are healed and redeemed in our Savior, who has conquered sin, death, and the devil. We nail our prayers to the cross. And then, after we've prayed all that we can pray, we worship, trusting that everything truly is in God's wounded hands.

And we wait for Easter.

Honor

As servants of God, . . . honor everyone. (vv. 16-17)

Some words come from a different era; they are not a part of our everyday language, and sometimes they seem outdated. Even so, such words still hold value. *Honor* is one such word. We do not often talk about honoring someone unless they have done something special to deserve it. We rarely think of honoring people in daily life.

The letter of 1 Peter, however, calls us to honor everyone. The word that we translate "honor" means to have reverence for, or to hold in high regard. Because all humanity is made in the image of God, each person can reveal God to us. Hence, we honor everyone.

In an age when we are so divided across our differences, the call to honor everyone is a reminder that through Christ, God has made a new way. Through Christ, God has bridged the chasm that separates us from God and one another. As servants of Christ, we bridge the chasm of discord by honoring one another, and thereby seeking the image of God in everyone we meet.

O God, help me to see your image in all people I meet today and to honor them. In the name of Jesus. Amen.





We enter Holy Week waving our palm branches as Jesus rides into Jerusalem, then continue our journey with Jesus through the passion story in the Gospel of Mark.




Maundy Thursday Mar. 28th 7pm

Ponder Christ's Great Commandment as you experience a hand washing ritual using the Liturgy of the Basins.




Good Friday Mar. 29th 7pm



Church in Society:

Caring for Creation: Coffee Anyone?

Lutherans and coffee go hand in hand, so maybe we should look at some environmental consequences of our brewing decisions.



Coffee is its own topic for another day, but in brewing and choosing filters we need to know a few details for make the best earth-friendly decision.

You can choose between a reusable metal filter, two types of white paper filters, or a brown paper filter.

Metal filters produce less waste because they are reusable, obviously. The quality of the coffee is impacted as more fine granules pass through a metal mesh filter, as well as more oils. Some folks prefer the robust coffee flavor produced, while others prefer a clearer, less acidic, and lighter product.

White filters come in two varieties. Those that are bleached with chlorine, and those that are bleached with oxygen. Chlorine bleached filters are the cheapest, though some connoisseurs can detect some residual chlorine taste, and this same chlorine does end up in the environment.

White filters bleached with oxygen are considered higher quality, are more expensive, but the product used to bleach them breaks down into oxygen and water, thus being eco-friendly. Look for the designation of TCF for products bleached with oxygen.

Brown filters are unbleached and thus more environmentally friendly. Connoisseurs may detect residual flavors in any type of paper filters, and these can be removed by rinsing the filter prior to brewing. Brown filters are typically sturdier and may even be listed as being compostable.

Coffee grounds in general are useful additions to your garden soil, adding tilth, and fertilizing your soil with their nitrogen content. Additionally coffee grounds can repel cats, kill slugs, and, when used as mulch, suppress weeds.

So, enjoy your cup of coffee and make the best eco-friendly decisions in how you brew it, and dispose of it.


