The Poetry of Lent with Mary Oliver:
A Companion with Cooks and Other Pilgrims

Prayer is a kind of doorway, Mary Oliver says. She says it directly, and, backing off, suggests the same. Says what? Suggests what? Patching words together is one. And here's another: the doorway into thanks, and a silence in which another voice might speak. During the 40 days of Lent, as participant and pilgrim, listening to sacred song, breaking bread, eating soup prepared by others, walking before and walking after, I found walking to be another entry into prayer. Often what came up—indeed what comes up—it's only beginning, nothing's over with, were the voices and stories of others. During this time, one poem of Oliver's has returned to me as my touchstone. Her poem, *The Messenger*, from her book, *Thirst*, contains these lines, written in my notebook, and recited every day:

Let me
keep my mind on what matters,
 which is my work,
which is mostly standing still and learning to be
 astonished.

These lines follow the poem's first line: *My work is loving the world.*

I fall into these lines and images every day as easily and often as I fall short of them. Some of the lines that stop me, might shock others. I hope I don't do that here. On the other hand, I hope that together, we all did some of that during our Wednesday lunch hour in the basement. Some disturbance is necessary in moving. I do hope that happened. After-all, there is considerable difficulty in singing Mary's Magnificat each week. The Magnificat, too, is a poem. The Christian (and English) poet, Sir Michael Edwards says, in his book, *The Bible and Poetry*, that poetry changes everything that it touches.

Others will have different lines of Oliver's that they will remember. The mystery is not knowing where or when, epiphanies will spring from. Poems remind us that things aren't over, they're just beginning. These days of Easter we're in right now. Oliver reminds us: Pay attention.

Her book that is taking its place on America's bookshelves, is the gorgeous-in-white volume, *Devotions*. My favorite, *Thirst*, finishes with these lines, also included in *Devotions*:

Who knows what will finally happen or where I will be sent, yet already I have given a great many things away, expecting to be told to pack nothing, except the prayers which, with this thirst, I am slowly learning.


